Hello Copa Friends and Neighbours

Greetings to all - hope that 2019 will be a good year. Just catching up with Copa crime statistics for last year. None recorded for October, excellent news. In November there was only one incident, a Break & Enter.

It will be interesting to see December and January results with the explosion of population in Copacabana over the Holiday season. Our little seaside village has obviously become a favourite place to holiday and enjoy. Police have changed the crime statistics reporting of raw data and will in future report any increase or spike in crime in a particular area to the NHW Area Coordinator.

Interesting to see more crime prevention ideas introduced and laws implemented for safer roads, further assisting police with their duties. High tech spy cameras have been introduced on highways to catch irresponsible drivers, misuse of mobile phones, speeding and other distractions. The road toll has been horrific with totally unacceptable numbers of road accidents, injuries and deaths.

Illicit Drugs:

Police and Customs officers are constantly seizing large quantities of imported and home produced drugs in illegal laboratories. It has been reported that Australia is now the most favoured country of destination for illegal drugs as the demand is highest, which is certainly very worrying. Police and all authorities are working at top level to eliminate this scourge from our communities.

Festival Drug Use:

It is welcome news that urgent attention has been paid to illicit drug taking and dealers at music and other entertainment festivals by police, security and all other relevant authorities. These functions are tremendously popular with our teen and twenties populations. Several young people have died due to overdose and many others hospitalised.

You can help by always reporting to Police any suspicious behaviour relating to illegal drug dealing and having an honest and open conversation about the risks with your kids. It could just save a life!

Cyber bullying on social media:

There is currently a 'Duty of Care' push to make social media companies responsible for harm caused by cyber bullying and offensive content on their networks. Surveys reveal that one in five teenagers are subject to cyber bullying and that figure is on the increase.

There is evidence that cyber bullying has a lasting and damaging effect on victims, including poor self-esteem, which can lead to depression and suicide. It is important to keep an open dialogue with our children and teens about the potential for them to be bullied online and to encourage them to discuss any such bullying with the family first, so that prevention strategies can be put in place at home and at school. 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Take a Hike!



With the weather about to cool down a little and the flurry of holiday activities a dim memory, you might want to plan a bit of a trek to fully appreciate the wonderful coastline, bushland and birdlife on our doorstep. There are many beautiful walks to tackle around Copa, and if you're feeling up to it, here's one suggestion.

The Bouddi Coastal walk stretches south from Macmasters to Putty Beach. It's an 8.5k walk (one way) and you'll pass by Maitland Bay & Little Beach. It's signposted. There are a few short, steep hills and a few stairs, but overall it's rated a fairly easy walk, so good for families and kids. The views are sublime and it will take about 3.5 to 4.5 hours. You know the drill: hats, sunscreen, water and sensible shoes. Putty Beach is at the Northern end of Killcare. It's not

patrolled but the waters are very tranquil and its not crowded (except over Christmas/New Year and Easter, when the camping ground is full of holidaymakers). So take your swimmers and reward yourself with a dip at the end of your walk.

Corey is an accomplished Surf Lifesaving champion who grew up right here, starting with Copa Nippers at the age of six. He won two State titles when he was in the Under 8s and many Branch and State medals for Copacabana SLSC in a wide variety of events before he moved to Terrigal SLSC at the age of 15. He attended Copa Public School and Terrigal High. Two years ago he moved up to the Gold Coast, where he now competes for Currumbin Vikings SLSC. His favourite events are **Board and Ironman.**

Now aged 21, Corey has an impressive array of titles under his belt, including fantastic results at the *World Surf Lifesaving titles in Adelaide at Glenelg in November 2018.* He came 2nd in the individual Board event and in the team events achieved Gold in Board Rescue; Gold in Tube Rescue and Silver in Taplin Relay for a total of 2 gold and 3 silver medals. Currumbin Vikings

were crowned the second best club in the world at this event from the 40+ countries represented.

Corey is currently sitting in 2nd place in the Board category in the Ocean Six Series and 15th place in the *Nutrigrain Iron Man series*. In the upcoming Queensland State Championships, Corey has been invited along by his sponsors, Engine, to participate in a clinic with some of the best Ironmen and Ironwomen in the world, where he will be signing posters and talking to fans.

Corey's next big goal is to make the Australian World Team for Italy 2020.

His weekly training session schedule will no doubt help him achieve that goal and is something all our young Copa competitors could aspire to.

His favourite training session is 'Any session with sick runners or pumping waves!' and his favourite quote "Be grateful with everything you have and you will be successful in everything you do" (Conor McGregor). Sounds like Corey is a humble and very grounded champion and we wish him all the very best in his chosen sport. His achievements have done Copa proud.

Corey lists his Coach, Michael King and his parents, Copa locals Paul Fletcher and Laney Bell as his mentors. Dad Paul supplied much of the information for this story and we are very happy to name Corey our *inaugural Copa News 'Local Hero'*.

Bye bye tourists, hello surfers!

With cooler weather, fewer tourists and generally better waves, Autumn/Winter is a favourite time for locals and others in the know to get a decent surf in and around Copa.



Stormrider Surf Guide gives Copa 5/5 stars and says:

 ullet Copacabana attracts a crew to the shallow rock ledge that forms the northern point of the bay. Sucky lefts unload on the outside section before peeling through to the fun inside sandbars on higher tides... The banks facing the lagoon entrance are inconsistent but can get good."

World Surf League at Avoca Beach

And if you want to see world-class surfers right here on the Coast, it's not too late to head to the Vissla Central Coast Pro at Avoca Beach, running until March 4.

This year the event has been upgraded to a World Surf League (WSL) Qualifying Series (QS) 3,000 rated event, the first ever QS3,000 event on Australian shores and a huge opportunity for competitors to improve their seeding early in the year. Jordan **Lawler**. Vissla team rider said 'These events are vital for surfers who are wishing to gain points to qualify for higher rated QS events and can even help surfers earn a spot on the Championship Tour. This event upgrade will really benefit competitors in this region and globally'.

There will be 176 seeded competitors from all over the world in the Mens' event, including 6 Aussies in the Top Ten, with circuit favourite **Owen Wright** at #1. Famous Avocans Wade Carmichael (#3) and Adrian **Buchan** (#4) will give the crowds their local heroes to cheer on, together with the other Top Ten seeds including surfers from the USA, France, South Africa and Brazil.



In the Women's event there are 112 seeds, with four Aussies in the Top Ten: Bronte Macaulay (#2); Phillippa Anderson (#5); Holly Wawn (#7) and Dimity Stoyle (#8). No 1 seed is Paige Hareb from New Zealand, and local surfer and 3 times National champion Kirra-belle Olsson is seeded #33. Surfers from Costa Rica, USA and Japan round out the Top Ten.

Avoca is sure to be packed with competitors, spectators and event staff, so get along early for a good spot to see this world-class surfing event. We hope all the competitors have a great event, and the waves co-operate to make the comp an exciting and successful one.


We have also been actively fundraising over the Christmas season with two bucket shakes at Erina, along with some generous donations from local individuals and businesses. The Brigade is most grateful for this assistance as it will all go toward better enabling us to help in any emergency.

As a direct result of donations and a government grant, new lockers will be installed to replace a wall of coat hooks, making storing gear and responding quickly much easier for members.

The season is still very much an active one, with fires in many areas across Australia. Don't forget to make sure you have a plan, we are in a very bushy area and could easily face a substantial fire at any time.

On moving to Copa twenty years ago, a common phrase I heard was 'Copa is the forgotten suburb' and 'poor cousins' of every other place. No one likes to hear that.

At the time I was a landscape designer/contractor and watched on as Susan Fahey Park sat largely unattended over the years except for the occasional mow, while the surrounding bush became further infested with weeds and the whole space remained under-utilised. I first approached the then Gosford Council in 2011 to see what improvements could be made. Since the space is the only park in our suburb, it seemed obvious to seek that it be upgraded to make it accessible and useful to all residents.

Over eight years we attended many meetings, made a ton of phone calls and engaged in much lobbying. However, despite a generally positive response there was no real progress made. Fast forward to 2018 - new Council, new Mayor, a couple of false starts and finally I was advised in January that Central Coast Council had allocated \$300,000 to upgrading the park in their draft budget for next year. That was exciting news but wasn't official enough to celebrate. Several Councillors have since expressed support for the draft budget allocation.

Finally we were advised that the State Government have committed \$200,000 to the project. NSW Planning Minister Anthony Roberts and Adam Crouch, Member for Terrigal, visited Copa on February 14 to make the announcement. So it can now be said we have close to a fully funded project. We are unclear at this stage whether the \$200,000 is in addition to the funding pledged by Council, or a contribution to it but we are making the optimistic assumption that we now have a budget of \$500,000. Stay tuned!

Community involvement and input will add much local value to the project. For some it will be regenerating the bushland, for others it could include a community garden or an exercise area. A natural bushland playground has been suggested while a space for ball games would certainly benefit many. Either way, it has always been the agreed position in any conversation that the Copa community will be consulted during the process of designing a space that is as ideal and inclusive as possible.

This project has so much potential benefit to a wide cross-section of the community – the kids who can enjoy a flat space to play and explore, the families who can have a picnic, the grandparents who can bring their grandkids somewhere other than the beach. We really hope everyone will be involved and contribute to make this valuable community space the best it can be.

Next steps will be guided by CC Council who will announce and direct the community consultation process. I hear they are pretty good at it these days. Meanwhile you can stay informed or add some ideas at the project's Facebook page – Copacabana Parklands Project. Lastly, thanks to those who have helped progress this work to this point – Copacabana Community Association, Central Coast Council staff and the locals we've met with and their input to date.



Copacabana Bushcare was established in 1993. Our aims are to improve and restore habitat for native birds and to stabilise the sand dunes. Over the years we have won several grants, enabling us to build the viewing platform and information signs that you see on our foreshores. Our major achievement has been to preserve and improve the coastal vegetation in the dune area. Without the hard work of our volunteers over the years, the native plants would be overrun with weeds, including the dreaded Bitou Bush (pictured above), which we are ultimately trying to eradicate.

If you'd like to help improve our environment but don't have a lot of time, come along to the Copacabana Bushcare afternoons where you can make a difference (and some new friends). We'll help you to understand the importance of the dune plants while you are helping to restore, enhance and protect our fragile coastal environment. You'll help with seed collection and propagation, learn bush regeneration techniques, flora identification and how to tell the good native plants from the weeds.

We meet on the first Saturday of the month: 2-4pm. Join us at the viewing platform opposite the shops. We'll always need new volunteers and you'll be made very welcome.

COPA SNIPPETS BUSH Care

Come and join our **Bushcare Group**





Bitou Bush is a major threat to NSW Coastal ecosystems and biodiversity.

Bitou bush is native to South Africa and was planted along the NSW coast between 1946 and 1968 to stabilize the dunes. However, it spread rapidly and is now found along 46% of the NSW coastline. In some cases, the weed has spread 10 kilometres inland.

Bitou invades native coastal heathlands, grasslands and woodlands. It grows quickly and forms dense stands, replacing native plants and destroying the habitat of native animals. Infestations can smother sand dune, headland and coastal vegetation communities. Many threatened species and plant communities have been affected.

The NSW Scientific Committee has listed the Invasion of native plant communities by Bitou bush and boneseed as a key threatening process impacting both native plants and animals.

A Threat Abatement Plan (TAP) has been prepared to reduce the threat posed by bitou bush and boneseed to threatened species, populations and ecological communities and species, which may become threatened as a result of invasion. If you have bitou bush in your garden, PLEASE remove it and cut and paint any roots with herbicide. Our Council no longer removes it.

COPA RESIDENTS TURN OUT FOR

Meet the Candidates Forum



On February 7, the Copacabana Community Association (CCA) hosted a public 'Meet the Candidates' forum for the NSW State election at Copa Surf Club.

The three major parties were represented.

Attending were **Adam Crouch** (sitting Liberal member for Terrigal), **Jeff Sundstrom** (Labor) and Greens candidate **Bob Doyle**. All had been given prior notice and content of five key questions the CCA Management Committee had composed, and were told that there would also be a further eight questions asked, comprising questions submitted by general members of the CCA.

Local residents turned out to hear the candidates' responses as they related to the seat of Terrigal, with particular focus on issues of interest to the Copa community. A brief summary follows here:


Winney Bay - next steps in overcoming the funding impasse - the need for revised/lower impact plans to be submitted is being discussed at Council, in the hope that the funding will be restored.

The Copa Masterplan - which has languished without progress for years – Mr Crouch urged Council to apply for regional NSW grant funding for this project

Coal seam gas exploration and seismic testing off the Coast - The three candidates were in lockstep on this issue, opposing any such testing and all saying they would not support any undersea gas exploration or mining proposals.

FUTURE PLANS FOR COPACABANA

And of course, the perennial issue for Copa residents – **roads repairs and funding** – was the subject of three separate questions, focusing on the dangerous and disgraceful state of Cullens Road (the site of many accidents) and the much needed upgrade to Del Monte Place which represents a danger to both pedestrians and motorists because of its narrowness, ditch, lack of footpath and poor surface. Meeting Chair, Steve Boucher, reminded the Candidates that over 1500 residents had signed a petition requesting upgrades over 4 years ago.







Mr Crouch encouraged Council to apply for funding for the Cullens Road improvements as a matter of urgency, and said that funding should now be available for this priority project through the NSW government's Safer Roads program. (We have since learned that Council has already applied for funding from the State government and are waiting on a response). Mr Crouch also reiterated the NSW government's commitment to the Del Monte upgrade, saying that it was a \$10m project and would be done 'in the longer term'.

The other major issue canvassed was the **Draft Consolidated LEP and DCP** plans, currently under consideration. The CCA and local residents want to ensure that the seaside 'village' qualities of Copa (and similar small hamlets) are not destroyed by inappropriate or over development made possible by (proposed) new zoning regulations and permissible developments.

All 3 candidates agreed that the character of Copa should be preserved and residents were urged to make submissions during the consultation period.

The Copacabana Community Association has made a submission to the LEP/DCP planning consultation process, strongly advocating for the beautiful, peaceful village atmosphere and environment at Copa to be retained for the benefit of all who live here.

Other questions from the members covered diverse issues such as Water quality / sewerage outfall at Winney Bay; Bus services; the proposed Copa Men's Shed; faster rail between Sydney - Gosford - Newcastle and palliative care on the Coast.



The evening was well attended, time limits for questions were strictly adhered to and the candidates all acquitted themselves well to the questions.

CCA President, Steve Boucher said 'We appreciated the attendance of the three candidates and were glad to give the Copa community the opportunity to hear their policies and opinions regarding issues of crucial local importance'.
