Kinna Dibb NRLW Champion

Kirra Dibb, a former student of Copa Primary and Sports Captain of Kincumber High (Class of 2015), recalls her 'entire childhood' spent at Copa Beach with her mates. She was a Copa SLSC Nipper, competed in a couple of branch carnivals and spent '9-5 at the beach on weekends.' Living on the Northern Beaches now where she works as an exercise physiologist in between matches, Kirra still regards the ocean as her 'happy place' to relax and unwind when she gets time.

It's no surprise that as a child Kirra was pretty much sports mad. She played for the Kincumber Colts – the only girl in the team from Under Sixes to Under 10s. After that she played 'everything else' including Oztag; soccer; Ultimate Frisbee; netball and basketball. These were baby beginnings for a stellar career in the NRLW which began when Kirra was 19.

Primarily playing in the halves, Kirra is an Australian and New South Wales representative player and over the years has played for the Sydney Roosters, New Zealand Warriors and Newcastle Knights in the NRLW and for the North Sydney Bears in the NSWRL.

She made her Origin debut for New South Wales in 2019, starting at five-eighth in their 14-4 win over Queensland and again played at five-eighth in 2022. NSW were again victorious, with Kirra scoring a 40-metre solo try.

2022 was a pretty good year, even by Kirra's standards: She was named the Harvey Norman NSW Women's Premiership Player of the Year, she played for Australia in the Indigenous All Stars team and in October she played in the Newcastle Knights' Grand Final winning team over the Parramatta Eels.

As to her greatest achievements in Rugby League, humble champion Kirra says that she believes it is her (and other female players') impact on the next generation and the mentoring they do. She is proud that girls can now see a pathway into a very real dream in the sport and that young boys no longer think it's odd to see women playing now because they've grown up with it. She says her role models are 'every female making a pathway in every sport' and comments that she loves seeing what's happening in women's sport across the country.

When asked about her Rugby League heroes, she says she is grateful to 'all the women who played before me. Women who sold their cars and quit their jobs to go on tour, who pushed the game ahead into the competition it is today that I am lucky to be part of.' She was also a big fan of Panthers and Roosters great Brad Fittler and was thrilled when she got to play for the Roosters.

In February 2023, Kirra again played in the Australian Indigenous All Stars team against the Maori Ferns in Rotorua and says this honour rates extremely high in her list of achievements.



'That week was probably my favourite week of rugby league. That game had an entirely different meaning. It really holds a very special place in my heart.'

Kirra acknowledges her parents, Mark and Lynette Dibb (who still call Copa home) who 'probably don't get enough credit' for the encouragement and support they gave her as a youngster, driving her to everything including games, training, camps and tournaments. With an older brother who works in the NRL, rugby league is in the blood for this family. Kirra says her parents are still her biggest fans.

With contract negotiations under way at time of writing, Kirra can't say yet where she will play this year. But she does say that her best game is 'always yet to come' and she wants to play at the same high level for as many years as possible.

We sure she has many representative honours to come and congratulate her on being a great role model for all kids who aspire to achieve at the top level in their chosen sport. We wish her well for the 2023 NRLW competition.



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Time to book in for your flu jab and maybe a Covid booster?

Flu season is coming

With our borders open again and people mingling with each other in large numbers after a few relatively isolated winters, it is likely that influenza cases will be on the rise this year, as they have been in the Northern Hemisphere winter.



Here are some ways to help prevent the spread of flu:

Get vaccinated:

It is important to get the <u>influenza vaccination</u> each year to continue to be protected, since it wears off after 3 to 4 months and flu strains (types) change over time. You may be eligible for a free flu shot. Call us to enquire or make an appointment.

Observe good hygiene:

Wash your hands and practice good hygiene by covering your mouth when coughing or sneezing. Throw used tissues in the bin immediately and don't share cups, plates, cutlery and towels with other people.

Keep surfaces clean:

Clean surfaces such as your keyboard, phone and door handles regularly to get rid of germs.

Those practices will also help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Give our friendly staff a call to discuss your vaccination needs and make an appointment as the surgery is likely to get very busy ahead of the flu season.

ATAGI now recommends COVID-19 boosters for certain groups

ATAGI now **recommends** a 2023 COVID-19 vaccine booster dose for adults in the following groups, if their last COVID-19 vaccine dose or confirmed infection (whichever is the most recent) was 6 months ago or longer, and regardless of the number of prior doses received:

- · All adults aged 65 years and over
- Adults aged 18-64 years who have medical comorbidities that increase their risk of severe COVID-19, or disability with significant or complex health needs.

ATAGI advises the following groups should **consider** a 2023 booster dose if their last COVID-19 vaccine dose or confirmed infection (whichever is the most recent) was 6 months ago or longer, and regardless of the number of prior doses received, based on an individual risk benefit assessment with their immunisation provider.

- All adults aged 18-64 years without risk factors for severe COVID-19
- Children and adolescents aged 5-17 years who have medical comorbidities that increase their risk of severe COVID-19, or disability with significant or complex health needs.

ATAGI advises that a booster dose is not **recommended** at this time for children and adolescents aged under the age of 18 who do not have any risk factors for severe COVID-19. COVID-19 vaccines can be co-administered with influenza and

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Copacabana Rural Fire Brigade

Copacabana Rural Fire Brigade is fully staffed by volunteers and began 2023 with a significant campaign to attract new volunteers. While it's been a very wet couple of years, a return to dry conditions and increased bushfire danger is inevitable and the need for a strong volunteer firefighter base remains strong.

The recruitment campaign was covered by NBN TV news and local print media and was backed up with a letterbox drop around Copa and nearby suburbs. Many locals will have seen our recruitment social media posts. Several information nights were held at the station for people considering joining to ask questions and tour the station. All this promotion has resulted in an influx of new people who will do their basic bushfire fighter training before joining activities in earnest, which is a great outcome.

It's not too late to become a volunteer with Copa RFB. All training and equipment is provided and you will be supported by a diverse group of existing members as you learn the ropes. If you would like to know more, you can message us via our Facebook page or call 4382 2400.

It's been a busy start to 2023 with regular call outs. These



included several motor vehicle accidents and emergencies. We helped out when a car got bogged on the beach, and when a car crashed into bush off Scenic Road at Kincumber. We assisted ambulance and police when a bushwalker suffered a medical episode in Bouddi National Park, and later helped Ausgrid when a tree branch came down on powerlines in Copacabana.

One of our Deputy Captains headed to northern New South Wales as part of a Central Coast strike team dealing with several large grassfires in the Namoi and Gwydir region. The risk of significant grassfires is high this year in inland areas with huge grass fuel loads after all the rain.

In between these activities, weekly training continued to maintain our crew's volunteer skills. All part of the diverse opportunities of joining the NSW RFS. Please get in touch with us if you want to get involved with your local brigade.

"Reclaiming the personal touch"

Facts, Figures and the 'pandemic effect' in Copa





We can all count our blessings living in beautiful Copa; long term residents regularly comment that the place 'hasn't changed much' over the years - and that's what people like about it. Thankfully our suburb hasn't been over-run with apartments and traffic jams like some others on the Coast (although peak holiday periods can be a bit of a challenge). Looking at the 2021 Census information, there have been a few notable changes since the last one in 2016, with some results obviously skewed dramatically because of the pandemic.

Our total population hasn't changed much - in 2021 it was 2,809 versus 2,735 in 2016. Fewer people are using their cars to travel to work compared to 2016, when it was 70.7%, while in 2021 the figure was 47%. That's not surprising considering the 'work from home' model adopted by so many of us: The figures showed just 8.3% of people worked from home in 2016 versus 34% in 2021.

There are a few interesting statistics on dwellings in Copa now, with the total number up marginally from 1,422 to 1,439 in 2021. We can see from the Census that more people are staying in those houses now than in the past; fewer houses were unoccupied in 2021 – 28.4% down from 32.3% in 2016. Again, not surprising given the trend towards 'seachanges and tree-changes' and a boom in the short-term and holiday rental market in the years between the studies.

Some general points of interest about Copa and its' residents: The majority of households are classified as 'family households' at over 79%; we are an educated lot with more than 30% having a Bachelor Degree or higher; 79.9% of us were born in Australia – well above the NSW average, and 65.4% are in the workforce. And pleasingly, 64.7% stated they had 'no long-term health conditions' vs the NSW average of 61%. Must be the healthy lifestyle and the wonderful natural coastal environment here. And we're getting a bit older: the median age is 43, up from 41 in 2016.

It will be fascinating to see how we've changed by August 2026 - the date of the next national Census - and whether the gloomy financial climate predicted over the medium term shows up any substantial changes by then. In any case, we can all agree that the laid-back 'beach and bush' surrounds will continue to provide a constant source of pleasure and well-being for us lucky enough to call Copa home.
